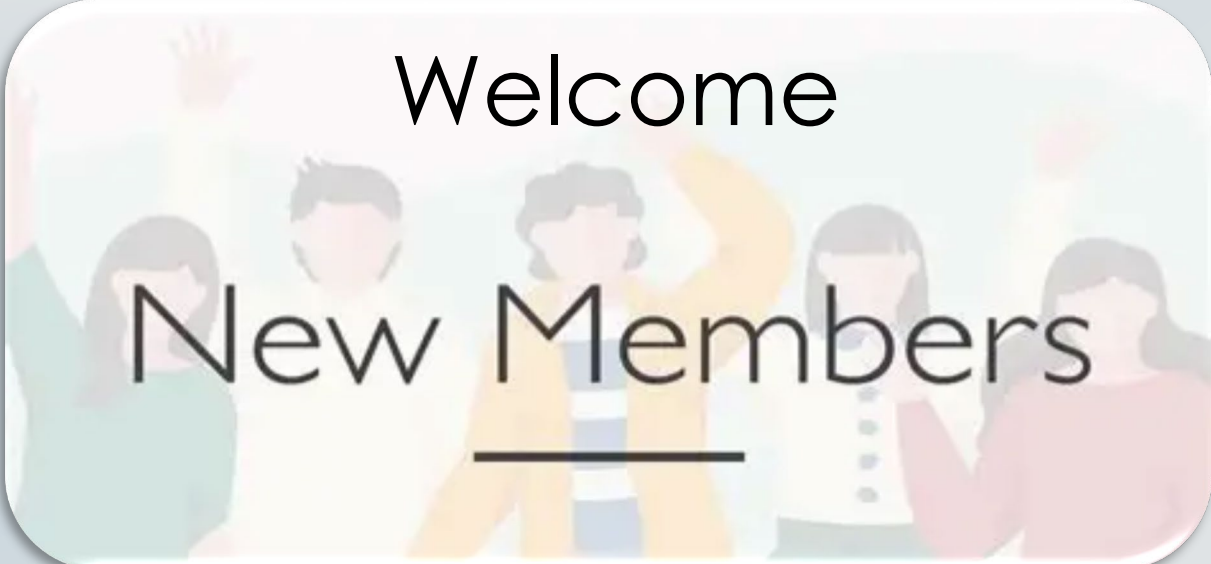

▶ Instructor spotlight

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Five minutes with Jason

Each edition we will get to know one of our instructors. This quarter we're chatting with our new Chief Instructor, Jason Luke.

Jason brings a wealth of experience with dogs and a strong association with our club to his new role. He first joined the club in the 1980s, returned for a couple of years in the early 2000s, and has been a member for the past five years. He currently owns an Australian Bulldog and has most recently owned another Australian Bulldog and an Australian Cattle Dog, with dogs being a constant throughout his life. Outside the club, Jason's work also involves engaging with and training dogs every day, so dogs are certainly a big part of his life!

Away from work and the club, Jason stays very active and enjoys spending time outdoors. His love of the Australian bush and its wildlife began when he was a young boy and developed into a strong interest in herpetology—the study of reptiles and amphibians. His other interests include fishing, wildlife photography and running ultramarathons, along with all the training and preparation that goes with them.



His training approach is simple: reward-based and patience. He believes understanding canine behaviour—and the needs of individual breeds—is essential to knowing why training works in some situations but not others.

What does Jason love most about being part of the club? The opportunity to help people improve their relationships with their dogs. He particularly enjoys game-based training, proving that learning doesn't always have to feel like work!

Jason describes his own dog, Lulu, as affectionate, playful and closely bonded with him. He also loves how bonded and in tune she is with everyone in the family. Whether she's out and about or relaxing on the lounge, Lulu is happiest wherever her family is.

If you haven't met Jason yet, you'll find him out on the fields on Sunday mornings. Be sure to say hello when you see him.

► Spring into training

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Spring is the perfect time to get outside and have fun with your dog. Whether you're working towards a competition goal or simply want a dog that's calmer around the house and on walks, the new season is a great time to start.

1. **Revisit the basics**
Even if your dog knows them well, practicing in different locations or with gradually increasing distractions can make those behaviours more reliable.
2. **Set a new training goal**
Maybe it's improving recall, relaxed greetings, walking calmly past other dogs or preparing for the next class grading. Specific goals make progress easier to see.
3. **Take training outside**
Your dog might be brilliant at home but "forget" everything when you're somewhere new or exciting. Start your training somewhere relatively quiet and gradually increase distractions. Parks and outdoor spaces can provide great opportunities to practice focus, recall and loose lead walking.
4. **Teach a new trick**
Tricks aren't just party pieces, they're a great way to build communication, engagement and confidence while giving your dog some mental stimulation. Ideas: high five, touch, spin, middle ...
5. **Keep sessions short, positive and fun.**
You don't need a 30 minute training block. A few minutes here and there is incredibly effective. Reward the desired behaviour and always end on a 'win'.

Remember that training shouldn't feel like work. A few minutes of fun and focussed interaction with your dog can go a long way – and you will both enjoy the process!

Six tips to teach me NOT to come

Call me without training me first

Expecting me to come just because you think I should is the equivalent of expecting a pay check when you have not worked. You need to put in the efforts to teach me if you expect rewards. I was not born with obedience skills. I must be taught to listen using patience and good planning.

Call me when I can't get it right

If you haven't done your homework and the distractions are heavy calling me to come will set us both up for failure. You need to teach me to respond around all sorts of distractions and that means repetition and planning. Take the time to build my response around distractions so I can learn how to be a good dog.

Call me and don't reward me

Dogs do what is reinforcing so if you want me to come when you call me you have to reward me with very high value rewards during the teaching and training phase. Once I am trained you can randomize rewards but whilst I am learning it is crucial that I learn that coming when called is a VERY valuable thing to do. If you do not reward me for coming to you the environment will certainly reward me instead.

Punish me when I do come

If I don't understand yet I will make a mistake at some point. If I ignore you when you call me it's because you haven't taken the time to train me right. If you punish me when I finally do come the next time you call I'll likely avoid you or even run the other way. Since I don't understand what you want you'll become very scary to me and I'll want to be anywhere BUT close to you.

Only call me to come when it's for something I don't like

Dogs do what is reinforcing. That means if I find something pleasant I'll repeat it and if I find something is unpleasant I will seek to avoid the behaviour that brought it on. If you only call me to come when you are ending my play, clipping on my lead, to punish me or call me into the house I'll learn to dislike the word "come" in a hurry.

Call me repeatedly and allow me to ignore you

If you haven't put in the training time you may get lucky for a while but eventually I will ignore you. Calling me repeatedly with no response will reinforce me ignoring your commands.

Dog socialisation - what it is, and isn't

IT IS:

- ❖ Exposure to different sights, smells, noises
- ❖ Exposure to different body handling (cooperative care)
- ❖ Being neutral around people, dogs and children
- ❖ Maintaining focus in highly distracting environments
- ❖ Building positive associations with all of the above

IT IS NOT:

- ❖ Playing with other dogs
- ❖ Meeting all people
- ❖ Going to dog parks
- ❖ Going to dog-friendly patios, restaurants and shops
- ❖ Greeting dogs on leash

Meet John Gibbons and Max, his three-year-old Murray River Retriever. John has been a member of the club for around two and a half years—pretty much for as long as Max has been old enough to attend.

John originally joined the club to learn how to train and socialise Max, while giving him opportunities to learn and experience things they might not otherwise do. John certainly has the rewards, describing his proudest achievement as seeing and helping Max grow into a well-mannered, well socialised and talented dog.

For John, the best thing about being part of the club is the interaction with like-minded people who love and care about their dogs, while learning how to train Max using positive methods. Having grown up in a time when harsh punishment was commonplace, John particularly appreciates the modern approach of rewarding and encouraging dogs when they get things right and punishment no longer being accepted.

Max certainly sounds like a dog who enjoys learning. John describes Max's nature as characteristic of his breed - intelligent, active, friendly, protective in a non-aggressive way, and loving. He's especially affectionate with John's wife and grandchildren.

John admits that Max has taught him a thing or two as well. In fact, his verdict is simple: "He is smarter than me!". Max can often pick up something after being shown just once—provided John communicates what he wants effectively. Max was toilet trained from day one and needed only one demonstration to master the doggy door. Although, this can also work against John, with Max working out how to steal sausages from places John thought were safely out of reach!



When it comes to mealtimes, Max loves to combine dinner with play. His dry food is put into toys and empty egg cartons, which he rolls and flips around to get to the food. And Max's favourite reward? Dehydrated kangaroo—homemade by John himself.

With Class 4 the next goal, there's clearly plenty more for John and Max to learn together. We look forward to seeing what they achieve!

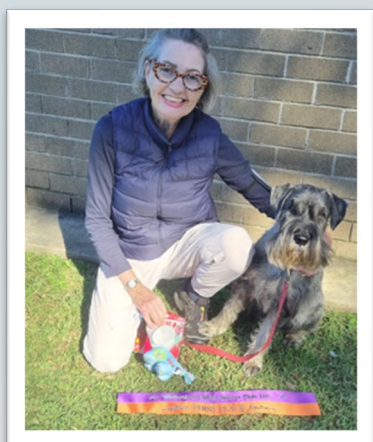

That resulted in us having to use our Jumps, a Tunnel and all of our Tunnel Bags. Dot Drescik, Trial Secretary and member of the Agility Committee, came to our rescue when we did not have the code to open the box on the trailer which contained two sets of Timing Gates. When we did gain access, we discovered that one of the Gates did not work so we had to manually time each run on the Agility Ring.

And at the end of the day, a flat tyre on the Agility Trailer added to our frustration. If it wasn't for the intervention of Sandra Walker, (Chief Agility Instructor) who resolved the majority of the problems we had setting up, I doubt that the trial would have got off the ground, and to Margaret Taylor for her invaluable assistance throughout the day.

The weather was a bit of a mixed bag. It started fine, until we had a down-pour mid-morning before fining up again. Thankfully, people were well on their way home just as another storm front came through.

Our Judges were Jason McFarlane (Agility) and Tsuey Hiu (Jumping). Their courses were challenging but a lot of fun. As the trial was on 'Home Ground' a number of our Agilites participated with a few coming away with Passes and Placings.

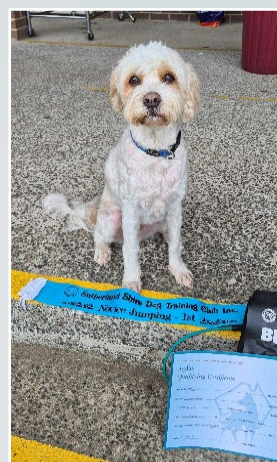

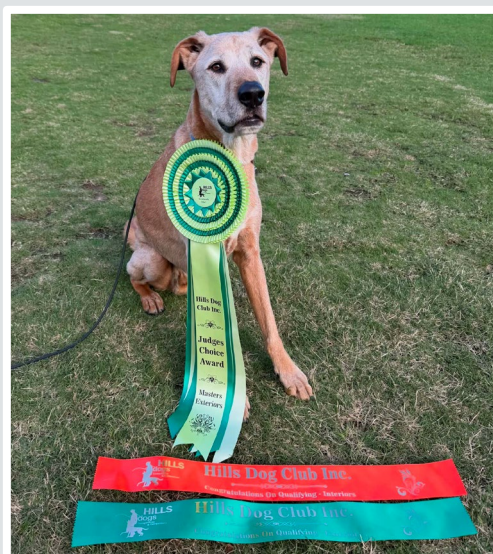

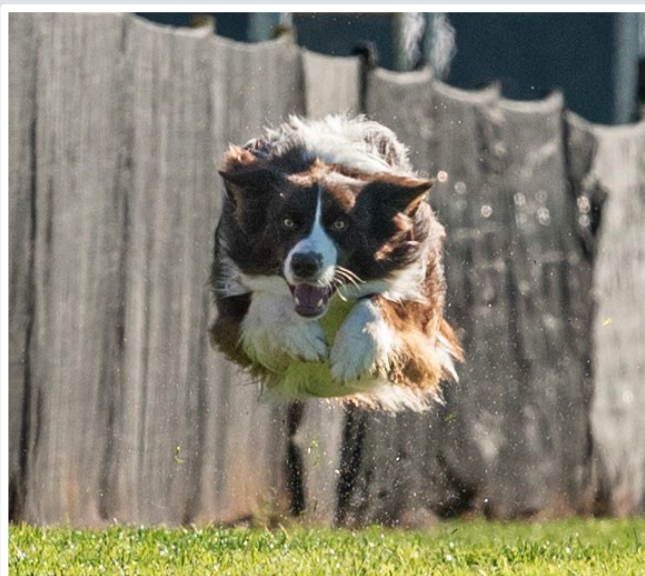

► Grading fundamentals

What does it take to grade up?

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Sutherland Shire Dog Training Club provides a progressive obedience training program, allowing members and their dogs to advance through the Club's training classes as their skills develop. Grading provides a consistent way of assessing when a dog and handler are ready to progress to the next level of training. Club Obedience Training Pathway:

Orientation → Class 1 → Class 2 → Class 3 → Class 4 → Club Medal → Club Medal Excellent

Orientation/Club introduction

Provides new members with an introduction to the Club, basic dog handling and communication skills, and the foundations to commence training in Class 1.

Progression to Class 1

Handlers and their dogs attend this class for one week only before progressing to Class 1.



Class 1

Progression to class 2

Grading takes place every Sunday at end of class.

At this level, handlers may encourage their dogs verbally and repeat commands. Checking a dog is not penalised.

Permitted: clicker & food rewards (luring).

Grading requirements

To progress to Class 2, the handler and dog are expected to demonstrate:

- ❖ a developing level of communication between handler and dog
- ❖ the handler's ability to touch, encourage and direct the dog during all heeling patterns
- ❖ heeling with a loose lead (as much as possible)
- ❖ execution of left and right turns and sits
- ❖ basic handling skills
- ❖ the handler's knowledge and ability to communicate commands to the dog.

Class 2

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Progression to Class 3

Grading takes place on the 2nd Sunday of each month.

At this level, handlers may encourage their dogs verbally, but only occasionally repeat commands. Checking a dog is penalised, consistent checking of the dog will result in a failure.

Not permitted: clicker, food rewards (luring).

Permitted: canine bridles and halters.

Grading requirements

To progress to Class 3, the handler and the dog are expected to demonstrate:

- ❖ loose lead (leash) work at all paces
- ❖ heeling at all paces on a loose lead, including sits and stands using signal and voice only. Downs are performed without force, although the dog may be 'guided' down by the lead
- ❖ sit stay: handler beside the dog for 1 minute
- ❖ down stay: handler beside the dog for 1 minute
- ❖ the handler's ability to communicate commands effectively to the dog.

Class 3

Progression to Class 4

Grading takes place on the 3rd Sunday of each Month

At this level, handlers may encourage their dogs verbally but may only issue one command. Handling the dog or checking the dog will incur a penalty. Consistent checking will result in a failure.

Not permitted: clicker and food rewards (luring), canine bridles and halters.

Grading requirements

To progress to class 4, the handler and dog are expected to demonstrate:

- ❖ loose lead (leash) work at all paces, including automatic sit
- ❖ heeling at all paces on a loose lead with sits, stands and downs performed using signal and voice only. The handler is not to touch the dog or guide the dog into position
- ❖ stand for examination, with the dog beside the handler, conducted to the applicable CCD standard. Dogs' paws movement will earn minor deductions as per CCD judging; movement of all 4 paws will result in failure.
- ❖ sit stay: handler 1.5 metres in front of the dog for 1 minutes
- ❖ drop stay: handler 1.5 metres in front of the dog for 2 minutes
- ❖ the handler's ability to communicate commands effectively to the dog.

Class 4 to Club Medals

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Class 4 is the highest level within the Club's regular obedience class grading structure.

Handlers and dogs who have successfully graded to class 4 may continue their progression through the Club's Club medal grading program.

Assessments are conducted under trial-style conditions

Food and clickers are not permitted during the assessment and normal trial-style handling requirements apply.

A qualifying pass obtained at an external trial does not count towards the 3 Club grading passes required for Club Medal or Club Medal Excellent.

CLUB MEDAL

Progression from Class 4

To participate in grading for Club Medal, the dog and handler must:

- ❖ be current financial members of the Club
- ❖ have successfully graded to class 4.

Grading requirements

- ❖ To obtain Club Medal the dog and handler must achieve 3 qualifying passes to the applicable Community Companion Dog (CCD) trial standard through the Club's grading program.
- ❖ Eligibility for Club Medal ceases once the dog has attained it's CCD title.

CLUB MEDAL EXCELLENT

Progression from Club Medal

To participate in grading for Club Medal Excellent, the dog and handler must:

- ❖ be current financial members of the Club
- ❖ have successfully graded to class 4
- ❖ have obtained Club Medal.

Grading requirements

- ❖ To obtain Club Medal Excellent the dog and handler must achieve 3 qualifying passes to the applicable Novice (CD) trial standard through the Club's grading program.
- ❖ Eligibility for Club Medal Excellent ceases once the dog has attained it's CD title.

GROUND RULES

Waratah Park

1. Members must be in class by the start time. Instructors have the right to refuse entry to the class if you are late.
2. All members must register at the payment line prior to start of class. No dogs will be permitted to join class without payment.
3. Members without membership badges may be refused admittance to class. If a member has forgotten their membership badge a temporary badge should be obtained from the clubhouse prior to payment of ground fees.
4. No bitch in season will be allowed to attend training.
5. Dogs must be **KEPT ON LEASH AT ALL TIMES** unless under the supervision of an instructor.
6. The handlers of dogs that foul the grounds must immediately clean up and deposit in one of the bins provided on the field or in Council cage.
7. Classes using the Club jumps and/or agility equipment will be responsible for returning the equipment to the equipment room after use.
8. Members must always behave courteously to other members and officials of the Club.
9. Any disputes should be referred to your instructor, the Chief Instructor or a Committee Member at the time of the dispute.
10. Members are responsible for the behaviour of their dogs and for any damage they may cause.
11. Members must wear closed-in shoes.
