An Amazing Experience at the Agility Novice Skills and Handling Clinic by Catherine Link.

Hosted at Canine Ed in the Southern Highlands, the clinic took place in their state-of-the-art, undercover agility arena, ensuring a comfortable training environment regardless of weather conditions.

The clinic was led by Iwona Golab, an esteemed instructor and the 2024 World Agility Champion. With her extensive expertise and passion for the sport, Iwona provided invaluable guidance throughout the session.

This small and highly personalized class was limited to just four participants, allowing each handler and dog to receive individualized attention. Over the course of three hours, we enjoyed four tailored sessions, with Iwona adapting her instruction to suit the unique abilities of each team.

### Yearly round up by Jan Taylor

Sunday 24<sup>th</sup> November was our last day of Agility training for the year. We decided to finish up by introducing the class to a Game in Agility called 'Strategic Pairs' or better known to some as 'Organised Chaos'. The idea is to have two teams running on course on rotation. You strategize who is better at Weavers or Contacts and then work out what section of the course each team will undertake. The obstacles are numbered and each team has to remember which obstacles they are doing. Sounds simple enough.....what could go wrong! Well if a team member drops a bar or does not hit the contact point on the Dog Walk or Scramble then it is up to the other team to complete and correct the mistake. And this is where the fun starts.

Sandra used a Novice Strategic Pairs course from the 2024 Agility Nationals so after setting it up and explaining the rules we set the class off to work out their plan. Confusion reigned! But when it came time to run the course some of the "Teams" did extremely well whilst a couple of others needed a guiding hand from Sandra, who was Judging. They all wanted to have another go, but sadly there was only enough time for one run each. Sandra promised to set up another Strategic Course next year. However even though Strategic Pairs does have a tendency to throw all of their training out the window and they are in survival mode to complete the course, Sandra was highly complimentary on how much their handling skills had improved. Agility training will recommence when training goes back in February but we will revert back to Wednesday night as Sunday morning is clearly too hot.



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# Grading Fundamentals



### Kindergarten/Club Introduction

Grading takes place each week at end of class

Handlers are introduced to the club, informed on basic dog to handler communication and shown basic commands. Handlers and their dog are in this class for one week only

### Class 1 to 2

Grading takes place every Sunday at end of class Handlers are allowed to encourage their dogs verbally and repeat commands. Checking a dog is not penalised. Clicker & food rewards (luring) are permitted.

### Core Elements

- Handler is to demonstrate a level of communication between them and their dog is being established
- Handler may touch, encourage and direct the dog during all heeling patterns
- Heeling with a loose lead (as much as possible), execution of left and right turns, sits and basic handling
- Handler is to demonstrate a knowledge/ability to communicate commands to the dog

### Class 2 to 3

Grading takes place 2nd Sunday of each month

Handlers are allowed to encourage their dogs verbally, but only occasionally repeat commands. Checking a dog is penalised, consistent checking of the dog will result in a failure. No clicker, food rewards (luring) permitted. Canine Bridle, Halti permitted.

#### Core Elements

- Loose Lead (leash) all paces. Sit stay and drop (or down) stays, Handler beside dog
- Heeling at all paces with a loose lead. Sits and stands using signal and voice only. Downs without force although the dog may be 'guided' down by the lead
- Stays: (A) Sit, handler beside the dog for 1 minute; (B) Down, handler beside the dog for 1 minute
- Handling: based on the handler's ability to communicate command



### Class 3 to 4

- Grading takes place 3rd Sunday of each Month
- Handlers are allowed to encourage their dogs verbally but only issue one command. Handling the dog or checking the dog will earn a penalty. Consistent checking must be failed. No clicker, food rewards (luring) permitted. No Canine Bridles or Haltis permitted.
- Core Elements
- Loose Lead (leash) all paces, automatic sit, stand for examination, sit stay and drop (or down) stays with handler in front of dog (1.5 m minimum)
- Heeling: at all paces with a loose lead. Sits to be automatic. Stands and Downs using signal and voice only. Handler is not to touch or guide the dog into any directed position.
- Stand For Examination: with dog beside handler. (Dogs' paws movement will earn minor deductions as per CCD judging). If dogs all four paws move, it is a fail.
- Stays: (A) sit, handler in front of dog for 1 minute; (B) down, handler in front of dog for 2 minutes
- Handling: based on the handler's ability to communicate command

### Class 4 to Club Medal

Grading takes place Sunday as per Judges Ring schedule

Three qualifying passes to Dogs NSW trial standard -> Community Companion Dog (CCD) Standard

Handlers should not encourage their dog verbally, and only issue one command. Handling the dog or checking the dog will earn a penalty (repeated checking will be failed). No clicker or food rewards (luring) permitted.

#### Core Elements

- Loose Lead (leash) all paces, Automatic sit, stand for examination, Recall, Sit stay and drop (or down) stays. Handler in of front dog
- Heeling: at all paces to an advanced standard (Automatic sits, stands and downs signal and voice only)
- \* Stand for Examination: as in a CCD Trial with the handler in front of the dog to the length of the leash. If dogs all four paws move, it is a fail.
- \* Recall: 12 metres off lead (components of exercise as in CCD Trail)
- Stays: (A) Sit, handler 5 metres in front of dog for 1 minute; (B) Down, handler 5 metres in front of dog for 2 minutes
- \* Handling: based on the handler's ability to communicate commands.
- Note: Pre-requisite is the handler and dog having graded to Class 4

### ▶Training Tips

### 5 Tips for High Energy Dogs



Tip 1: A Tired Dog is a Good Dog

A tired dog is a good dog! A treadmill is a GREAT way to burn off a little extra energy before bedtime, on rainy days, or when you simply have a dog who needs a little extra burn before their daily excursions. I WALK my dogs predominately on the treadmill. The idea is not to get their fitness level so high that it exceeds your energy level, but to burn off a bit of energy in a slow, controlled fashion. Twenty minutes of "walkie time" as I call it on a treadmill will prepare you and your dog for a more enjoyable hike later in the day. Think of it as a warm up. You might add five minutes of trotting to get the tongue lolling, but mostly calm walking is best to condition a relaxed mind.

### Tip 2: Teach Your Dog Patience

Teach your dog the concept of patience. We tend to go places. We always have a destination. In horse training there is a method of tying a horse on what is called a patience pole. They simply learn the skill of doing nothing for long periods affixed to a pole sunk in the ground. In dog training, your dog needs to learn to be patient and relaxed while on leash. YOU can be the patience pole. If it can be done with a thousand pound animal, surely we can teach Fido to just wait. Do nothing. Go no where. Coffee shop patios are great for this. Also, teach your dog to be patient and travel in a crate. They exit the vehicle calmer in most cases and allow you to get your equipment organized before the dog exits the vehicle so you aren't in a mad rush. If you are rushing because your dog is wound up, who is in the driver's seat?

#### Tip 3: Make a Training Box

Get the equipment to help you accomplish these things. Make a training box or bag. Training leashes, collars, Bitter Apple Spray for barking, squirt bottles, treats are all part of my training box. You may need a pro to help you properly implement their use and perfect techniques, but without the right gear you are wasting your time.

#### Tip 4: Double Up with Exercise + Patience

Pick three to four activities lasting an hour or more to do with your dog each week to burn exercise, then practice being a patience pole during that activity for 15 of those minutes. Hiking, biking, trip to the beach or lake, field trip to Petsmart or Home Depot, etc. Don't wait to do your training until you have to make a vet appointment, or when your child is playing in a soccer game. Practice before you need the skills. With a high-energy dog, you may need to treadmill before you engage in these activities to manage their enthusiasm.

### Tip 5: Enrichment Treats

Enrichment treats such as bones with frozen peanut butter on the inside, stuffed Kongs, knuckle bones, bully sticks, and pig ears are all example of some great enrichment items to create calmness while inside the home, kennel, or crate.

### Conclusion

So, stock up your training bag. Get a strategy in place to pre burn some energy BEFORE your dog excursion, and schedule your weekly field trips. Put a plan in place and try it for two weeks and you will see a big difference in your dog's behavior.

Who knows? You might even want to go to the next level and enroll in more challenging courses for fun!



### Rally Class wrap up for 2024

What a fantastic year the Club's Rally Group, which meet on a Monday evening, have had with multiple Passes, Placings and Titles through all four trialling levels (Novice, Advance, Excellent and Master). There have also been several new people that started throughout the year and all are showing wonderful potential. The group is very friendly and keen to help and guide our new people when neither I or Shanelle are available. We hope that with our own Club trial in May 2025 the bulk of entrants will be from Sutherland. However, if trialling is not for you that is not a problem as we encourage members to expand their enjoyment of just being with their best friend and having fun.

So, what is "Rally"? Some refer it to "Agility for Obedience Dogs" and this is because, like Agility, the Judge will set out a course, you have time to "Walk the Couse" and ask questions or clarification of the Judge about certain signs before you and your dog attempt the course. The difference between pure Obedience and Rally is that in Rally you can talk encouragingly to and pat your dog whilst on course. No food rewards are permitted in a trial. The Novice signs are very basic, such as Sit, Drop, Stand, About Turn, Weave between Cones,.....etc. If you think Rally might be right up your alley then put your name down with the ladies in the office. We will accept Club members from Class two onwards on the proviso that their dog is stable, non-aggressive and has a solid knowledge of basic Obedience positions and heeling.





### ▶Spotlight On

### Instructor Carol Crowe






Carol is one of the Grade 1 instructors on the Athletics field. No doubt you have seen her on the field on Sundays with little jumps and things set up for her beginners. Carol is a self-confessed dog geek and always looking for more to learn. She loves nothing more than going to a good workshop or course with other dog geeks. Her husband complains that when she get together with other dog geek friends all they talk about is dogs - and this a problem why ??

Carol joined the club in 1992 with her rescue bull terrier cross, Sarah. Sarah was a cruelty case, and Carol, along with her husband, worked towards building up Sarah's confidence after a pretty bad start in life. A trainer suggested they bring Sarah down to the club and they worked through the grades and did some Obedience trialling. They also did Flyball, Tracking and Agility. Sarah was the very first dog in the club to get her Endurance Title. She also passed the then NSW Canine Council Canine Good Citizen test — an amazing feat for a dog that came to them completely terrified of almost everything and fear aggressive. Agility, however, was where Sarah really excelled. Carol was asked to take on the Chief Agility Instructor role which she held until I resigned from the position in 2001. Carol continued to organise and act as MC for the Club at our demonstration each year at the Lugarno Lions Club Spring Fair and has many fond memories of trials and weekends away with the SSDTC agility mob.

Carol then took a very long sabbatical from dog training but kept up training at home with her Kelpie/Border Collie cross Rex and Eclectus Parrot, Spuddy. At this time, she was also working for the NSW Police Dog Unit which she loved. Sadly, both Rex and Spuddy left way too soon, and Carol decided no more dogs/birds. In 2016 Carol had spinal surgery and feeling very lonely at home on her own, decided it was time to get another dog. Along came Buddy, the rescue Kelpie cross, Carol's heart dog. He is 14 now and as smart as ever.

In 2019 Carol was really missing training dogs so decided to get a formal qualification and start training dogs again. She completed the National Dog Trainers Federation Certificate 111 Dog Behaviour and Training course. Buddy was the perfect dog for doing some of the practical assessments including the teach dogs complex skills and assistance dog training modules. Carol approached the club to see if they would be interested in having a "not quite yet" qualified dog trainer to volunteer and they said "Yes". Carol successfully completed the course at the end of that same year and have been instructing at the club ever since.

Carol says she "loves coming down to the club each week and working with my wonderful "newbies". It is so rewarding to see club members start to build that close bond with their dogs. I can also say that through the club I have met some wonderful lifelong friends and some truly extraordinary dogs."

### ▶General Rules

#### **Ground Rules**

- Members must be in class by the time specified. Instructors have the right to refuse entry to the class if you are late.
- 2. All dogs must be vetted by the appointed vetting officers before you proceed to a class. No dogs will be allowed on the field before being vetted.
- 3. Members without membership cards may be refused admittance to class.
- 4. All dogs must be immunised against Distemper, Hepatitis, Parvovirus and Para influenza and Kennel Cough.
- 5. Current inoculation certificates must be produced when renewing membership.
- 6. No bitch in season will be allowed to attend training.
- 7. All dogs must be kept on a leash at all times unless under the supervision of an instructor.
- 8. All handlers of dogs who foul the grounds must immediately clean up and dispose of the matter in the bin/s provided.
- 9. Classes using the Club jumps and/or agility equipment will be responsible for returning the equipment to the equipment room after use.
- 10. Members shall behave courteously to other members and officials of the Club at all times.
- 11. Any disputes should be referred to the chief instructor or a committee member at the time of the dispute.
