

Calendar of Events



The 2025 Beginner course will commence on 2nd March. There will be a Beginner Agility Orientation Day on 16th February where dogs will be assessed for their suitability for Agility. We have a couple of spots available so if you are interested in doing Agility, whether it be for competition or fun, you will have to register your details with the ladies in the office before 16th February. But before you do you will need to meet the following criteria.

- Dogs who are overweight, or have any Back, Hip, or Leg problems should seek Veterinary advice before doing Agility. This sport puts extreme pressure on your dog's body, so soundness of bone and muscle is important.
- You must be in Grade 3 or above at the time of commencement
- If your dog is either Dog or People aggressive then Agility is not for them.
- We train only Dogs over 16 months of age, as by this time all their bones should have finished growing (except for large dogs, this may take a little longer).
- All Dogs must have a certain amount of obedience training ie, to sit, drop or stay on command, be able to work off lead, to return to handler when called:- no matter what is going on around them at the time.


You must be able to accept advice and criticism plus come to class with a positive attitude.

Bindy Update from Sandra Walker

Bindy's fracture finally healed after a long 13 weeks. I have commenced her rehabilitation which is going to take some time for her recovery. Luckily for both of us Bindy is a very compliant patient! Robyn and Kobi did an online course with <u>Bronagh Daly</u> at Fenzi Dog Academy on "Near and Far Forward Focus versus Come to Hand". Here is the starting info

When it comes to successfully and comfortably completing an agility course, clarity is the most important thing. Our dogs need to know when they should be taking the obstacle ahead of them and when they should be turning or coming into us. The most common errors that I see on agility courses is when dogs lack this clarity. So how do we achieve it?

1. Clear understanding of handlers' arm positions is a big one!

When you raise your arm up in the air, dogs will naturally tend to extend/jump bigger. When you bring your arm low towards your body, dogs will naturally pay more attention. However, as we get further into our agility journey, we often muddy this. As a result, this can often cause our canine teammates to guess at what we mean instead of know with full clarity. And that can lead to errors on course or us over-handling.

2. Clear and predictable verbals for coming into us/bypassing something and carrying on ahead/taking what they're looking at.

Dogs all have their preferences. Some prefer to extend and carry ahead without us, while some prefer to stick with us. This can occur due to what they find most rewarding, but it can also be a combination of not being sure *when* they should be doing either of these things. This can then cause a lack of confidence for one or the other (and sometimes even both!). That's where verbals can really help! So to assist our dogs (and ourselves!), we're going to be teaching our dogs a come to hand verbal and a go ahead verbal.

Grading Fundamentals

What does it take to grade up?

Kindergarten/Club Introduction

Grading takes place each week at end of class

Handlers are introduced to the club, informed on basic dog to handler communication and shown basic commands. Handlers and their dog are in this class for one week only

Class 1 to 2

Grading takes place every Sunday at end of class

Handlers are allowed to encourage their dogs verbally and repeat commands. Checking a dog is not penalised. Clicker & food rewards (luring) are permitted.

Core Elements

- Handler is to demonstrate a level of communication between them and their dog is being established
- Handler may touch, encourage and direct the dog during all heeling patterns
- Heeling with a loose lead (as much as possible), execution of left and right turns, sits and basic handling
- Handler is to demonstrate a knowledge/ability to communicate commands to the dog

Class 2 to 3

✤ Grading takes place 2nd Sunday of each month

Handlers are allowed to encourage their dogs verbally, but only occasionally repeat commands. Checking a dog is penalised, consistent checking of the dog will result in a failure. No clicker, food rewards (luring) permitted. Canine Bridle, Halti permitted.

Core Elements

- Loose Lead (leash) all paces. Sit stay and drop (or down) stays, Handler beside dog
- Heeling at all paces with a loose lead. Sits and stands using signal and voice only. Downs without force although the dog may be 'guided' down by the lead
- Stays: (A) Sit, handler beside the dog for 1 minute; (B) Down, handler beside the dog for 1 minute
- Handling: based on the handler's ability to communicate command



Class 3 to 4

Grading takes place 3rd Sunday of each Month

Handlers are allowed to encourage their dogs verbally but only issue one command. Handling the dog or checking the dog will earn a penalty. Consistent checking must be failed. No clicker, food rewards (luring) permitted. No Canine Bridles or Haltis permitted.

Core Elements

- Loose Lead (leash) all paces, automatic sit, stand for examination, sit stay and drop (or down) stays with handler in front of dog (1.5 m minimum)
- Heeling: at all paces with a loose lead. Sits to be automatic. Stands and Downs using signal and voice only. Handler is not to touch or guide the dog into any directed position.
- Stand For Examination: with dog beside handler. (Dogs' paws movement will earn minor deductions as per CCD judging). If dogs all four paws move, it is a fail.
- Stays: (A) sit, handler in front of dog for 1 minute; (B) down, handler in front of dog for 2 minutes
- Handling: based on the handler's ability to communicate command

Class 4 to Club Medal

Grading takes place Sunday as per Judges Ring schedule

Three qualifying passes to Dogs NSW trial standard -> Community Companion Dog (CCD) Standard

Handlers should not encourage their dog verbally, and only issue one command. Handling the dog or checking the dog will earn a penalty (repeated checking will be failed). No clicker or food rewards (luring) permitted.

Core Elements

- Loose Lead (leash) all paces, Automatic sit, stand for examination, Recall, Sit stay and drop (or down) stays. Handler in of front dog
- Heeling: at all paces to an advanced standard (Automatic sits, stands and downs signal and voice only)
- Stand for Examination: as in a CCD Trial with the handler in front of the dog to the length of the leash. If dogs all four paws move, it is a fail.
- * Recall: 12 metres off lead (components of exercise as in CCD Trail)
- Stays: (A) Sit, handler 5 metres in front of dog for 1 minute; (B) Down, handler 5 metres in front of dog for 2 minutes
- * Handling: based on the handler's ability to communicate commands.
- Note: Pre-requisite is the handler and dog having graded to Class 4

Training Tips

A Guide for Travelling with Pets



Caravanning and camping holidays are a great way for families to enjoy the great outdoors together, and that should include the beloved family pet!

It is important to plan when travelling with pets and the following tips will provide you with the knowledge and ideas to make your holiday a pleasant one for all.

Did you know?

It is illegal to drive in NSW with a pet on your lap. For safety pets must be restrained in a carrier or harness to prevent them moving around the car. (The laws regarding restraint of dogs in or on vehicles can vary between the states/territories).

No dogs, cats, birds and other domestic pets (other than trained assistance animals such as guide dogs) must not be taken into national parks, state conservation areas, nature reserves, historic sites or Aboriginal areas.

Accommodation

There are many caravan / holiday parks that welcome pets however pet policies may vary. When making your booking, contact the park directly to:

Ensure that there has not been a change of policy; and

Find out whether any conditions apply

During your stay at a caravan / holiday park, make sure you:

Respect the park's regulations and be considerate of your fellow guests – don't allow your pet to dominate the space.

Always pick up any dog droppings.

Keep your pet under control at all times, as much as for their safety as the safety of those around you.

Travelling

Ensure your pet is comfortable and safe whilst travelling.

For safety, pets must be restrained in a carrier or harness when travelling.

Vehicle restraints for dogs are widely available and include restraints that either attach to existing seat belts or have buckles that clip directly into the seat belt.


Transport containers should enable the animal to lie down comfortably in a natural position, stand and sit erect, turn around and stretch with clearance. Always ensure they are secure so it won't slide or shift in the event of a quick stop.

Do a trial run before your holiday as this will identify if they have a travel phobia. Consider several trial runs, lengthening the duration each time.

A 30-minute drive on various surfaces and corners will be enough to see how they react. Anything that doesn't happen is unlikely to occur during a longer trip.



Training Techniques We Use


Our group employs a variety of effective training techniques, including:

- Positive Reinforcement: Rewarding desired behaviors with treats, praise, or playtime.

- Shaping: Gradually rewarding successive approximations of the desired behavior.
- Capturing: Waiting for the dog to naturally perform the desired behavior and then rewarding them.

General Rules



Ground Rules

- 1. Members must be in class by the time specified. Instructors have the right to refuse entry to the class if you are late.
- 2. All dogs must be vetted by the appointed vetting officers before you proceed to a class. No dogs will be allowed on the field before being vetted.
- 3. Members without membership cards may be refused admittance to class.
- 4. All dogs must be immunised against Distemper, Hepatitis, Parvovirus and Para influenza and Kennel Cough.
- 5. Current inoculation certificates must be produced when renewing membership.
- 6. No bitch in season will be allowed to attend training.
- 7. All dogs must be kept on a leash at all times unless under the supervision of an instructor.
- 8. All handlers of dogs who foul the grounds must immediately clean up and dispose of the matter in the bin/s provided.
- 9. Classes using the Club jumps and/or agility equipment will be responsible for returning the equipment to the equipment room after use.
- 10. Members shall behave courteously to other members and officials of the Club at all times.
- 11. Any disputes should be referred to the chief instructor or a committee member at the time of the dispute.





Our club enforces a no dog attack policy. This means if your dog has attacked another dog or human you will be asked to purchase from the clubhouse (or elsewhere) a muzzle to use whilst on SSDTC grounds during training sessions. Please understand that the enforcing of this policy is for the safety of our trainers, members and their dogs Removal of the muzzle at a future date to be decided by senior instructor(s) assessment on the aggressive dog
