Training Tips

Teaching Recall

a routine into your dog's day which he enjoys taking part in. Recall should never mean "if I run back to my owners, they'll put me back on leash" but always, "if I run back to my owner, it's usually worth my while". With adult dogs, all recall training is easier done using a long line, which is dropped on the ground & dragged behind the dog. Never go from a short leash to no leash. Instead, use a long line which gives your dog freedom without you losing control. Here is a guick guide to recall training, both for use with young puppies & older, more routine established dogs. First, pick a recall command (not your dog's name) and only use it when the dog is either running towards you, or can be enticed towards you, because you are worth running to (what reward are you offering?). Start all training in a low distraction environment such as your house and/or garden. Only call your dog to you when you are sure he will come back, or you can bring him back or go to get him. Don't waste your recall command, no point in calling if he's ignoring you. Always make it worth your dog's while to come back to you, at first using food or his favourite toy. Surprise him with the reward, sometimes use his boring food kibble, sometimes using real chicken, liver, hot dog, cheese. Always keep him guessing & deliver the reward in a fun way. Don't just push it into his mouth. Toss it, drop it or roll the food/toy. When first training recall on a long line, give & expect 100% attention. This means that even if he's only on the long line for 2 minutes, during this time you are playing with him. This way, he's really paying attention to you & enjoying his time as the most fun he has on a walk. If you cannot watch your dog, he should be on a short leash.

As with any training, recall is all about putting

Invent games to keep your dog thinking "it's always worthwhile to check in with mum/dad". Any voluntary engagement by the dog should be rewarded. Use tasty treats & toss or roll them on the ground. Take out his favourite toy & play for a short period when he's not expecting it. Drop some food, then quickly run away calling his recall command. When your dog catches up, drop some more food & run away again. Teach your dog a range in which to stay while walking off leash. When he's reaching the end of his longline, give a command such as 'this way', then stand briefly on the line before immediately changing direction. This teaches your dog to watch you, as you're unpredictable & he may lose you if he doesn't keep an eye on where you are going. When you've done this a few times, begin to change direction without saying anything, always rewarding your dog when he catches up. Teach your dog that the quicker he comes back, the guicker he'll get to resume what it was he was doing before you called him. This improves speed of response & enthusiasm & means you don't always need to use a food or toy reward. The quickest way to teach a dog not to come when called, is by allowing him to run up to & play with every dog he sees. This is confirming in his mind that you are less fun than other dogs who are always worth investigating. This is also the quickest way to get your dog beaten up by other dogs. When you see another dog, always teach him to sit & not leave you until you release him. Remember just because your dog is friendly, does not mean the other dog is. If your dog does not have a reliable recall, regardless of the distractions present, he simply should not be off leash. Every dog should be able to be taught a reliable recall so that, where appropriate, they can run free. This is, after all, the biggest reward you can give any dog.

Grading Fundamentals



Kindergarten/Club Introduction

Grading takes place each week at end of class

Handlers are introduced to the club, informed on basic dog to handler communication and shown basic commands. Handlers and their dog are in this class for one week only

Class 1 to 2

Grading takes place every Sunday at end of class

Handlers are allowed to encourage their dogs verbally and repeat commands. Checking a dog is not penalised. Clicker & food rewards (luring) are permitted. Core Elements

- Handler is to demonstrate a level of communication between them and their dog is being established
- Handler may touch, encourage and direct the dog during all heeling patterns
- Heeling with a loose lead (as much as possible), execution of left and right turns, sits and basic handling
- Handler is to demonstrate a knowledge/ability to communicate commands to the dog



Class 2 to 3

Grading takes place 2nd Sunday of each month

Handlers are allowed to encourage their dogs verbally, but only occasionally repeat commands. Checking a dog is penalised, consistent checking of the dog will result in a failure. No clicker, food rewards (luring) permitted!

Core Elements

- Loose Lead (leash) all paces, Sit stay and drop (or down) stays, Handler beside dog
- Heeling at all paces with a loose lead. Sits and stands using signal and voice only. Downs without force although the dog may be 'guided' down by the check chain
- Stays: (A) Sit, handler beside the dog for 1 minute (B) Down, handler beside the dog for 1 minute

Class 3 to 4

Grading takes place 3rd Sunday of each Month

Handlers are allowed to encourage their dogs verbally but only issue one command. Handling the dog or the use of check chain will earn a penalty. Consistent checking must be failed. No clicker, food rewards (luring) permitted!

Core Elements

- Loose Lead (leash) all paces, automatic sit, stand for examination, sit stay and drop (or down) stays with handler in front of dog (1.5 m minimum)
- Heeling: at all paces with a loose lead. Sits to be automatic. Stands and Downs using signal and voice only. Handler is not to touch or guide the dog into any directed position.
- Stand For Examination: with dog beside handler. (Dogs' paws are not to move during examination)
- Stays: (A) sit, handler in front of dog for 1 minute (B) down, handler in front of dog for 2 minutes
- ✤ Handling: based on the handler's ability to communicate command



Class 4 to Club Medal

Grading takes place 4th Sunday of each Month or as required

Three qualifying passes to Dogs NSW trial standard > Community Companion Dog (CCD) Standard

Handlers should not encourage their dog verbally, and only issue one command. Handling the dog or the use of a check chain earn a penalty (repeated checking will be failed). No clicker or food rewards (luring) permitted.

Core Elements

- Loose Lead (leash) all paces, Automatic sit, stand for examination, Recall, Sit stay and drop (or down) stays. Handler in of front dog (2.0 m minimum)
- Heeling: at all paces to an advanced standard (Automatic sits, stands and downs signal and voice only).
- Stand for Examination: as in a CCD Trial with the handler in front of the dog to the length of the leash
- Recall: 4 metres off lead, handler returns to dog or dog to be finished as requested by grader (NOTE if the dog moves as the handler returns a failure will result).
- Stays: (A) Sit, handler in front of dog for 1 minute.(B) Down, handler in front of dog for 3 minutes
- Handling: based on the handler's ability to communicate commands.
- Note: Pre-requisites of (1) the handler and dog having graded to Class 4 and
 (2) the handler has not previously trialled at an official ANKC obedience trial

Club Medal Excellent

Srading takes place 4th Sunday of each Month or as required

Three qualifying passes to Dogs NSW trial standard >Novice (CD) Standard

Note: Pre-requisites of (1) the handler and dog having graded to Class 4, (2) having gained Club Medal, and (3) the handler has not previously trialled at an official ANKC obedience trial





What is Rally?


Rally promotes a positive relationship between the dog and its owner, and it is a great way for the beginner to start trialling with their dog. Rally was designed as a way to introduce people who are working through their obedience levels into the world of dog sports and for everyone, whether they are seasoned triallers or not, to simply just have fun with their dog. Rally provides an environment where the handler can encourage their dog by talking and rewarding by voice, but not handling the dog in any way.

Rally is often described as a combination of Agility and Obedience. A Rally course is set out with numbered stations including a start and finish. Handlers have the opportunity to walk the course to become familiar with it before competing. Dog and handler then navigate the course by following the numbers and carrying out the exercise shown on the sign positioned at each of the numbered stations. Dogs work in the "Heel" position between exercises.

At the entry level of Novice, dogs negotiate a course having between 10 and 15 signs (not including the start and finish) and work on lead during the test. There is a total of 76 signs available to be placed on a Rally course gradually increasing in complexity as the level of Rally becomes higher. The higher levels of Rally, Advanced, Excellent and Master use up to 24 signs including many of the more complex ones and the dog is required to navigate the course with the handler off lead. Encouragement using verbal rewards and hand signals are permitted, but not touching the dog in any way.

In Rally, competitors complete the course on their own while a Judge scores the round without offering assistance. Rally has a far more relaxed atmosphere than other dog sports and each run is a different series of exercises, and you never know what the course will be until you do the preliminary walk through.

Rally training is held on Monday nights from 7:00pm.



Agility Report

First of all, we would like to thank Lee Collett for taking over as Editor of the Wag from Shanelle Corben. The Wag has been an instrumental part of communicating upcoming events, welcoming new members, providing inspirational training tips, health, and wellness knowledge for our dogs, a run-down of accomplishments from our Triallers (Obedience/Rally/ Agility/Tricks/Dog Dancing/ Scent Work etc) and an historical library of events that transpired since the Club's inception 60 years ago. I always looked forward to a new edition of the Wag and would eagerly rush home from training, grab a cup of coffee, put my feet up and read the magazine from cover to cover. So welcome Lee, we know you will have big shoes to fill, but from all accounts so far you have well and truly excelled.

When the Sutherland Shire Dog Training Club (SSDTC) first started 60 years ago Obedience was all that was on offer as far as competition was concerned. SSDTC was one of the top Obedience clubs in Sydney and club members were inspired to train hard with the ultimate aim of being able to represent our club at trials. But then in the 1980's Agility (based on Equine Show Jumping) was hatched in England and it took off like wild-fire around the world. An Agility Group was established at Sutherland in the 1990's and some of our first Instructors are still with the Club today – Carole Crow and Margaret Taylor. Our current Chief Instructors is Sandra Walker. Sandra is an Agility Judge and until recently a key member in the Judges Training Scheme and was on the Agility Committee. We are fortunate to have Sandra and her intricate knowledge of Agility.



Agility has changed a lot over the past 30 years. When we first started to trial, it was a very community-based environment, everyone knew everyone else and we had so much FUN. Now competitor numbers have increased, it is faster, the courses are technically challenging, people doing Agility are younger (and fitter), dogs are streamlined and, in some cases, bred specifically for Agility. But the ultimate aim in Agility is still to have fun and bond with your dog.

After the success of our first Sunday morning Beginner Agility Class in 2022, we received permission from the SSDTC Committee to conduct a second Sunday morning Beginner Agility Class which commenced in April this year.

Technically it was to go for four months, but wet weather, illness and competitions seen it stretched out to six months.

Those who started the course were: Carole Sharkey & Pip, Geff Taylor & Murray, Yvonne Wu & Rio, Patricia Pestana & Ziggy, Jenni Gormley & Dolly, James Brizi & Nari, Lyn Cairns & Darcie, Ingrid Stefan & Monty.



Most of these Club members have gone on to join the Wednesday Night Agility Group and we welcome you on-board for your next level of training. Our **next Beginner Class is scheduled to begin in March 2024.** If you are interested in trying out for Agility, please see the ladies in the Club House and provide them with your details.

One of Sutherland's most decorated Agilites, Nga Bustamante, has provided an insight into her Agility career.



The last time I wrote a report for the Wag was when Poco had just started trialling. He got his first Novice Jumping Pass at Dogs NSW (Orchard Hills) and his first Novice Agility at Tuggeranong Dog Club in ACT.

Then Covid hit and trialling ceased for a long time.

Fast forward, he now has his Master Jumping Dog x5 Title and only needs 20 more Jumping points for his Championship, whereas in Agility, he has 3 Master Agility Dog titles but still needs nearly 200 points for his Championship.



The partnership between Poco and me is rather complicated. I am getting too old and the brain is not functioning very well. Every time we received a Disqualification in Jumping it is always my fault for looking at the wrong jumps. He would keep hassling me for not telling him where to go fast enough. A friend of mine jokingly demanded that I shared half of the Qualifications which we attained due to her directing me from the ringside. I am much better at remembering Agility courses as they have big landmarks such as the Dog Walk and the A-Frame. However, Poco is a flying bat in disguise. Every time we missed out on a Qualification card it was always because he failed to make contact on the Dog Walk or the A-frame, or both.

I am putting a lot of hope on my new dog Lily because it is so much easier to run her than Poco. Lily has been entered in two Novice Jumping trials so far: the first was a Disqualification but she had only one fault in the second run.



Spotlight On

Chief Instructor: Lyn Walsh

This year Lyn Walsh has had the privilege of being voted Chief Instructor at Sutherland Shire Dog Training Club.

Lyn is a Qualified Dog Trainer listed with *The Association of Pet Dog Trainers*.

Lyn's journey began with the club in 2007 when she joined with her 1-yearold terrier cross, Zoe. Zoe was a rescue dog fine with people but very dog reactive.

Lyn spent Sunday mornings at the club with Zoe lunging and barking at other dogs while Lyn became stressed, embarrassed and sometimes shed a tear.

Lyn was referred to a senior instructor named Noella Smith. Noella was a positive trainer who understood what Lyn was going through. Noella gave Lyn some positive reinforcement exercises to work on and Zoe gradually started to improve. Lyn & Zoe managed to move through the grades to level four which was a great achievement.

Lyn could see what could be done with the right training and realised she could also help other people and their dogs and so Lyn trained to become an instructor at the club.

Lyn & Zoe joined the flyball team and participated in demonstrations at dog events, including the Royal Easter Show.

Zoe had come long way from being plucked from the streets as a stray, however still a nervous dog and not suitable for competition work so Lyn settled on doing activities Zoe enjoyed.

Lyn was still keen to get into competition work and realised she needed a dog that was able to do this.

Lyn spent some time researching training methods, how dogs learn, different dog sports and dog breeds.

In 2010, Lyn purchased an 8-week-old Miniature American Shepherd who she named Scout.

Meanwhile Lyn had also found a new dog sport – Canine Freestyle (Dances With Dogs). Canine Freestyle was trained with a clicker and positive reinforcement. After attending a workshop at Dogs New South Wales Lyn soon found herself competing.

Lyn, Zoe & Scout were still training at the club, participating in demonstrations at nursing homes and having fun, but Lyn really wanted to learn more about dogs and training them. Lyn participated in many workshops on different topics with presenters from overseas and in Australia including:

- Karen Sadler (New Zealand) Obedience
- Vicki Austin (NSW) Reactive dogs
- Claudia Moser (Switzerland) Freestyle
- Brad Thurlow & Karen Eaton (NSW) – Obedience

With all the knowledge Lyn gained she found herself successfully competing in Canine Freestyle (Dances with Dogs), Obedience and Rally with Scout achieving Level 3 Title in Freestyle, Level 2 Title in Obedience and Level 3 Title in Rally.

They have performed dancing, tricks and obedience demonstrations at various canine events. Participating in the last Mass Obedience Performance in 2011 at the Sydney Royal Easter Show was a definite highlight.

Lyn purchased another Miniature American Shepherd named Quanah and has been successful with him gaining a Level 1 Title in Freestyle, Level 2 Title in Trick Dog, Level 1 Title in Obedience, and Level 3 Title in Rally.

Lyn's training and bonding with her dogs has been both challenging and very rewarding and brings Lyn back to her beginnings with Zoe who has now passed.

Lyn is also involved in training dogs for commercials, short films and other TV work and is the assistant animal wrangler for Loretta Rabbitt and her performing poodles on the Channel 7 *Morning Show*. Watching canine body language in various situations is very interesting.

The knowledge Lyn obtained during her journey found her wanting to do more for nervous and reactive dogs. Rescue dogs are a popular choice for people but they can come with a lack of confidence and socialisation.

Lyn attended a seminar run by the Association of Pet Dog Trainers. The speaker was Mike Moeller from San Francisco's *Society Prevention Cruelty Animals* (SPCA) and his specialty was leash/reactivity discussing the use of Canine Body Language and how to work with shy fearful dogs.

Advanced Canine Behaviours

- Canine Behaviour Assessment
- Behaviour Modification and Rehab of Dogs & Cats

In 2019 Lyn completed a Qualified Dog Trainers Course with the *Institute of Modern Dog Trainers*.

To gain as much knowledge as possible to help dogs with problems, Lyn has read many books on reactivity in dogs and attended many courses and webinars such as The Canine Brain – IMDT, Anxiety busters plus others - Ryan Tate, Red Flag Behaviours -Dr Lucy van der Weide BScVMS MANZCVS, Canine Adolescence – IMDT & Aggression and Separation Anxiety (4 days) - Michael Shikashio.

For many years, Lyn has volunteered at local animal shelters until this year when health issues forced her to stop with many tears being shed and Lyn missing the little souls so much.

Lyn's latest course this year was Easy Peasy Puppy Instructors Course. Steve Mann, who started the Institute of Modern Dog Trainers in the United Kingdom many years back, came out to run the course himself.

Lyn is immensely proud of what she has achieved in all things dogs although she says it has been a late bloom.

Lyn has chosen to volunteer at the Club sharing her knowledge with fellow instructors and people in need of help with their dogs to say thank you to Sutherland Shire Dog Club for their financial help in part of Lyn's education.

Lyn has a love of all animals but a real passion to help fearful, reactive, and shy dogs.

Ground Rules

provided.

8. Classes using the Club jumps and/or agility equipment will be responsible for returning the equipment to the equipment room after use.
